### **Tandanya National Aboriginal Cultural Institute**

Tandanya on Grenfell Street has been established as a place of learning for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. Don't miss this experience if you are interested in exploring the extraordinary diversity of Aboriginal cultures. Open daily from 10am – 5pm.

### **Art Gallery of South Australia**

Open daily from 10am to 5pm, the Gallery features contemporary and heritage art displays. Admission is free though charges may apply for entry into touring exhibitions. Easy walking distance from the city, the gallery is located on North Terrace with the South Australian Museum next door.

### **South Australia Museum**

The South Australia Museum on North Terrace is home to the Aboriginal Cultures Gallery which holds the largest collection of aboriginal artefacts in the world, and is a must for visitors interested in Australian Indigenous culture. Open daily from 10am – 5pm. Admission is free.

### **Adelaide Botanic Garden**

One of Australia's most beautiful botanic gardens. A perfect place to relax, have a picnic and check out the native flora. Free guided walks daily at 10:30am. Walking distance from the city and close to the Art Gallery and Museum. During February and March, open weekdays from 8am – 6.30pm and weekends from 9am – 6.30pm. Admission is free.

### **Adelaide Central Market**

Don't miss out on a leisurely breakfast at the Adelaide Central Market, in the heart of the city. Soak in the atmosphere and colour of the market, which boasts the largest range of fresh food in the southern hemisphere. Located next door to the conference venue on Grote Street.

### **National Wine Centre of Australia**

Open daily from 10am-6pm, the National Wine Centre of Australia is home to the largest selection of Australian wines in the world. Take an interactive Wine Discovery Journey and experience the challenges of winemaking to the pure joy of drinking good wine. Located next to the Botanic Garden on the corner of North Terrace and Hackney Road.

**Jam Factory Contemporary Craft and Design** Located on the Corner of Morphett Street & North Terrace, this is definitely worth a visit for those interested in designer-made glass, ceramics, jewellery, textiles, wood and metal. Take your credit card! Open Monday to Friday 9am to 5.30pm, Saturday 10am to 5pm, Sunday and Public Holidays 1pm to 5pm. Admission is free.

### **The Beach**

Adelaide's city beaches are close and reasonably clean. Glenelg is one of the most popular. To get there, catch a tram from Victoria Square in the centre of the city.

Wander along Jetty Road and explore the shops, or relax with a drink and ocean views and watch the world go by from the Grand Hotel.

Or take a bus from Currie Street to Henley Beach, where the pace is slower, the area is less commercial and the atmosphere is more laid back.

### **BEYOND ADELAIDE**

If you have some time to venture further a field, South Australia has an array of beautiful places to visit.

Drink world-beating wines among breathtaking vines. Swim with sea lions, dolphins, luminescent cuttlefish, rare seahorses ... even great white sharks (although we'll put you in a cage for that one).
